HRDC - Health Hazards

Amongst the numerous hazards that infants and toddlers face in the typical rural Nepali village home, falling into open fines continues to be an important cause of morbidity and mortality. Despite decades of service, burn contracture releases and rehabilitation continues to be an important part of our work at HRDC. Just in the past year, nearly four hundred children required intervention (plastic surgery) for the sequel of burns sustained at home, mostly from open wood fire.

Improving safety for the growing child in the home environment is fundamental. It seems absurd that such accidents still continue to happen. Often toddlers attend to infants while parents are busy working in the fields or elsewhere. The recipe for disaster is ripe, just around the corner.

There is a great need for heightened awareness drives in rural communities to highlight the serious hazards of open fire cooking. Safer and less hazardous cooking amenities must be made available in the rural communities to eliminate the menace of home burns in children. Where accidents do occur, early, prompt and appropriate care would help prevent or minimize many serious complications.

Story

Huma Pun was 16 years old when she was first evaluated at our field clinic in Gulmi one day. Having lost her mother early, she had a very rough upbringing, the culmination being the accident of falling into the open fire, burning her legs, which auto amputated because of complications. Crawling was her mode of mobility. Shunned and ostracized by many in the village and school, her life was a bundle of misery.





Once Huma was under the care of HRDC, her life has taken a full turn around. The amputation stumps of both legs were revised and she was fitted with prosthetic



legs bilaterally. The result was nothing short of dramatic. Huma has regained her mobility and is gaining her confidence gradually to meet the challenges of life that lie ahead of her.
